Jane is now in heaven with God, her father, and one day we will see her again. The story doesn't finish because she's died. She is now not in pain or suffering and never will be again. We have this amazing hope for the future, a secure hope that is ours. Let's hold on to that and look to God in our pain, cry out to Him and let Him comfort us.
